## Railway Guns in Dover & East Kent Area

The railway guns would fire at shipping from strengthened firing spurs on the military railway. SR and LMS diesels were used to bring these heavy items up, to avoid steam and exhaust from revealing the movement to enemy spotters in France, where many more, heavier guns lay in wait. Dover, or "Hell Fire Corner," was heavily shelled very often in the course of the war.
